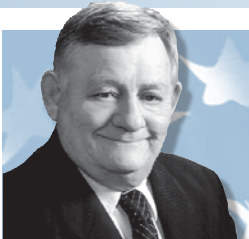

## MAYOR'S LETTER

I can't believe we are in 2010 already. It seems like yesterday we were worrying about switching into the new millennium. But as we look back over the last ten years, a lot of great things have happened in St. John. The Rock Road Streetscape was completed; Shop N' Save and St. John Crossings was built; The City developed a Master Plan for our parks. St. John Park

has already been enhanced based upon this plan and Home Heights will be done in the next several years; North Ave. was totally renovated from Valleywood to Woodson Rd.; the City began a Senior Citizen Program; our Parks were made safer with the Park Ranger Program; and last, but certainly not least, our Crime has had an overall decrease. All of these enhancements, renovations and programs have increased the quality of life for our citizens.

In 2010, all of us will join everyone in the United States to participate in the Census. This is very important to the City of St. John so please take time to read the article in this newsletter regarding the Census - what it means to us, as well as some safeguards to keep in mind when participating.

Construction wise for 2010, the City will be doing some major street construction on Valleywood and in the 3600 block of Marshall. The new Public Works facility will be completed which will add to the efficiency of our Street Department by working out of one location. The City will also continue to upgrade its webpage in order to provide more information to our residents, as well as be more user friendly.

## PROPOSITION "W"

St. John voters will be asked to consider Proposition "W" on the April 6th Ballot. This measure will create a fund for residents to use in the event their water shut-off box needs to be relocated. Just like the residence sewer lateral which connects your home to the main service line, so does the water service line. Both of these are the property of the homeowner and should repairs be necessary, they could be costly without programs in place to assist. The City is proposing a special fund be created for the relocation of defective water stop boxes. Some residents have had to pay for this service and it proved to be very costly. The fund would be created by the assessment of \$1.00 each month on your tax bill. Several years ago, a similar measure was approved by voters in St. Louis County for water service line repairs under certain conditions, however, it does not provide for relocation expenses. The City has recently found that stop boxes (shut-off valves) have been found under streets, sidewalks, etc. due to the fact that they were installed at the time the house was built in the right-of-way and prior to streets being paved or sidewalks installed as far back as in the 1930's. Some streets have been widened over the years with no knowledge of where the homeowner's shut off valve was located. Even though they may be under a street right-of-way, they

are still the property of the homeowner and cannot be relocated or repaired using City tax dollars .

Voters are asked to consider this proposal which will assist you if this ever happens to you.

## APRIL 6TH ELECTION

On April 6th voters will go to the polls to elect a Mayor for the City and a Councilman for their respective Wards. Only the incumbents filed this year, so there is no opposition.

# 2010 CENSUS TO BEGIN

The 2010 Census is about to begin and a correct count is **EXTREMELY IMPORTANT** to the City of St. John. The City strongly urges you to take time to provide accurate information to the Census worker or to fill out the form that you will receive in the mail. Several sources of revenues are directly dependent upon the population in the City of St. John. With the economic conditions we are experiencing, we cannot afford to lose revenues because of an inaccurate count. Since Federal and State Funds are also based on census counts, you can see why these counts are so important. Once the official counts

are turned in, the City must live with those counts for ten years.

Information recorded on the Census forms is strictly confidential and viewed only by the U.S. Census Bureau. The City of St. John cannot access any of this information. The Better Business Bureau offers tips on what information you should & shouldn't give out. 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## 2010 CENSUS TO BEGIN SOON.....

### *Do You Know What Information you should & should not give out?*

With the U.S. Census process beginning, the Better Business Bureau (BBB) advises people to be cooperative, but cautious, so as not to become a victim of fraud or identity theft. The first phase of the 2010 U.S. Census is under way as workers have begun verifying the addresses of households across the country. Eventually, more than 140,000 U.S. Census workers will count every person in the United States and will gather information about every person living at each address including name, age, gender, race, and other relevant data.

The big question is - how do you tell the difference between a U.S. Census worker and a con artist? The BBB offers the following advice:

If a U.S. Census worker knocks on your door, they will have a badge, a handheld device, a Census Bureau canvas bag, and a confidentiality notice. Ask to see their identification and their badge before answering their questions. However, you should never invite anyone you don't know into your home.

**DO NOT** give your Social Security number, credit card or banking information to anyone, even if they claim they need it for the U.S. Census. **REMEMBER, NO MATTER WHAT THEY ASK, YOU REALLY**

**ONLY NEED TO TELL THEM HOW MANY PEOPLE LIVE AT YOUR ADDRESS.**

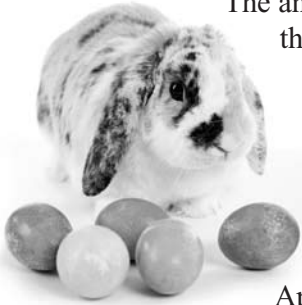
While the Census Bureau might ask for basic financial information, such as a salary range, **YOU DON'T HAVE TO ANSWER ANYTHING ABOUT YOUR FINANCIAL SITUATION.** The Census Bureau will not ask for Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers, nor will employees solicit donations. Anyone asking for that information is **NOT** with the Census Bureau.

And remember, the Census Bureau has decided not to work with ACORN on gathering this information. No ACORN worker should approach you saying he/she is with the Census Bureau. Eventually, Census workers may contact you by telephone, mail, or in person at home. However, the Census Bureau will not contact you by e-mail, so be on the lookout for e-mail scams impersonating the Census. Never click on a link or open any attachments in an e-mail that are supposedly from the U.S. Census Bureau.

## CITY OF ST. JOHN'S ANNUAL EASTER EGG HUNT

This means you should plan on cleaning out that crowded garage, basement or storage area on the weekend of the 17-18th, then put the stuff to be thrown away on the curb on your regular trash day. As usual, we will ask Allied Waste to provide an extra truck to be sure that they can get all the expected additional trash. Please try to put the extra trash out in trash cans if possible, but if not, stack it neatly at the curb. Large or bulky items such as white goods, large appliance boxes, etc. should be called into Allied Waste so they can schedule a bulky item pick up. The chipper will make its final run through the City the week of April 26, so please use the weekend of the 24-25th to do your spring yard clean up so you can put out the limbs to be chipped by Monday morning.

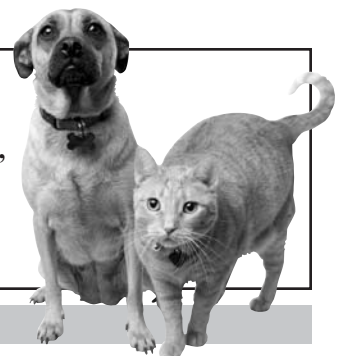
## CITY WIDE GARAGE SALE

## SENIOR CITIZEN UTILITY TAX REBATE

Utility tax rebates started being issued February 1st, and will run April 30, 2010 for the year 2009. The rebate is \$30.00 per household. In order to qualify for this rebate, residents must:



- 1) Have turned sixty-five (65) years of age or older at some point during the year 2009;
- 2) Currently reside in the City and have previously resided in the City for the entire calendar year of 2009;
- 3) Apply between February 1st through April 30th on forms provided by the City for a rebate on the previous year's taxes.

***Qualified residents need to provide the following documentation to the City Hall in order to collect the rebate:***

- 1) Picture identification;
- 2) Identification showing current address and date of birth;
- 3) One utility bill for January 2009 and one bill for December 2009 reflecting the address which they reside at and are requesting the rebate for.

## NORTH AVENUE PROJECT UPDATE

The North Avenue Reconstruction Project is approximately 90% complete. There are some yards which opted to keep their zoysia sod, so they will not be re-sodded until spring. Also, the street will be striped and painted with stop bars and other traffic markings. We have identified several "punch list" items that the contractor will need to correct or remedy, but otherwise, the project is almost complete. The contractor had 400 days to complete the project from the day we signed the contract with them, which was in May of 2009, so to be this far along at this point in the project schedule is remarkable indeed. We are very pleased with the contractor's performance overall and believe that we have a brand new street that will serve our City well for many years to come.

# NEW TEXTING PSA'S SPELL OUT GRIM REALITY..... YOU TEXT. YOU'RE NEXT.



If it sounds grim, it's because all too often it is. Distracted driving is the leading cause of traffic crashes in Missouri and nationwide. The Missouri Coalition for Roadway Safety has created radio public service announcements to remind teens that texting while driving is illegal and can have serious consequences. "The PSAs should serve as reminder that all drivers, not just teens, should focus on the road and not on distractions that can cause accidents," says Leanna Depue, Director of the Highway Safety Division. "Put the cell phone down. That text can wait. Your life can't." The text messaging culture is too new to be captured on traffic crash reports, but its dangers are well documented. Studies show texting drivers spend up to 400 percent more time with their eyes off the road. In Aug. 2009, Missouri became the 23rd state to ban texting while driving, but only one of nine states to limit it to a specific age group: 21 and under. ## PET WASTE



Residents are reminded that pet waste left uncollected and disposed of creates a health hazard for our City. In addition to providing food for rats and other varmints, pet waste carries pollution into the storm sewer system which can adversely affect our water quality. City Ordinances require that pet owners clean up and properly dispose of pet waste in their yards within 24 hours. Those residents who walk their dogs around the City are reminded that they are required to bring with them some means of scooping up their pet's waste immediately so they can dispose of it properly. There is a pet waste station in St. John Park and Reed Park which provides bags for cleaning up after your pet, and residents are reminded that dogs are not allowed in Home Heights Park. A reminder: proper disposal of pet waste is to put it in a sealed bag and place it in the trash, or by flushing the waste down a toilet.

## MOSQUITO CONTROL

As we are once again approaching the season when the mosquitoes will once again begin to become a nuisance, residents are reminded of what they can do to help control this pest. The most effective means to keeping the mosquito populations down is to eliminate their primary breeding places, standing water. Mosquitoes require a standing pool of water in which to lay their eggs. Larva will hatch and develop into adult mosquitoes within one week, so keeping stagnant water pools cleaned out is the most effective management tool. This means you need to empty out bird baths, pet water dishes, and anywhere water can stand undisturbed for a week. This means property owners must be diligent when it comes to surveying their property and finding these potential mosquito breeding grounds and eliminating them. Here are some specific things you should consider:

- a. Dispose of any containers outside that hold water such as old tires, cans, buckets, pots, etc.
- b. Cover boats, canoes and wheel barrows or store them inside out of the weather when not in use.
- c. Empty wading pools and bird baths every couple of days, and keep water in larger swimming pools circulating with a pump.
- d. Fill holes in trees with sand or grout.
- e. Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets that would fill low spots in the yard.
- f. Clean rain gutters and down spouts regularly and do not allow them to become clogged with leaves or other tree debris.
- g. Make sure that any drainage ditches or swales passing through your property remain flowing and free of obstructions and debris that might cause water to pond. If water does pond, apply larvicide.
